## MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The school year 2015-16 was another year of unprecedented growth for ONE TO ONE Literacy. The program operated in 84 schools in Vancouver, North Vancouver and Burnaby, up from 71 the previous year.

This year we also developed a new strategic plan, which lays out our objectives for growth over the next 5 years. It is our goal to reach many more struggling young students who would benefit from one-to-one reading practice with a caring adult. This plan will see us double the number of students we serve by 2020-21 by expanding within the districts already served and into new districts in the Vancouver area. We are well on our way with another 12 local schools expected to adopt the program in 2016-17, including expansion into the Richmond School District.

We also realized another major goal – to launch the program provincially, making the program available to any district outside the Vancouver area that wishes to adopt it. This Provincial Program operates under a slightly different model, in which a community literacy organization manages the program day-to-day, but ONE TO ONE Literacy Society provides training, resources, and ongoing support.

The concept of this Provincial Program has some history as one of our early volunteers took the program to Vernon when she moved there 20 years ago. The program expanded into other districts in the Okanagan region, but it operated quite independently from the ONE TO ONE Literacy Society. This year, thanks to a significant donation from an anonymous donor, we secured a Provincial Program Coordinator. Not only did she bring the districts which had been independently operating the program back under the ONE TO ONE umbrella, she developed an “exportable” program package, and launched the program into another new district on Northern Vancouver Island.

Between the local and provincial programs, this year our volunteer tutors were able to help over 3,300 BC students develop literacy skills to last a lifetime.

## ABOUT THE ONE TO ONE LITERACY PROGRAM

ONE TO ONE is a children’s literacy program that provides one-to-one tutoring by trained volunteers to elementary school students who struggle with reading. Our volunteer tutors work with students identified by their teachers as needing support with their literacy skills, because they have fallen behind their peers and are not reading at grade level, but who are not designated to receive school-based resources. Often these children do not receive literacy support at home and would otherwise fall through the cracks in the system. Each student spends approximately 30 minutes, twice a week, with a trained ONE TO ONE volunteer tutor in the school during normal school hours.

Not only does the program develop the students’ literacy skills, but it allows the students to practice reading in a safe environment, where it is okay to take risks and make mistakes, and they develop relationships with their tutors that foster self-confidence.

Our program began in 1989 as a collaboration between the Vancouver School Board and the Junior League of Greater Vancouver, and has grown considerably. The ONE TO ONE program is available to any student in any of our participating schools. There is no cost to schools or students. The ONE TO ONE Literacy Society is a registered charity and our program is completely funded by grants and private donations.

## THE CHILDREN WE SERVE

Research shows that receiving one-on-one instruction from a caring adult significantly impacts a child's reading skills.

Our approach is to initiate early, critical intervention into the lives of at-risk children, which is an issue for children in all areas of our community. Children who are not read to, don't have books in the home or do not grow up in a home where fluent English is spoken, fall behind in reading and literacy skills and never catch up.

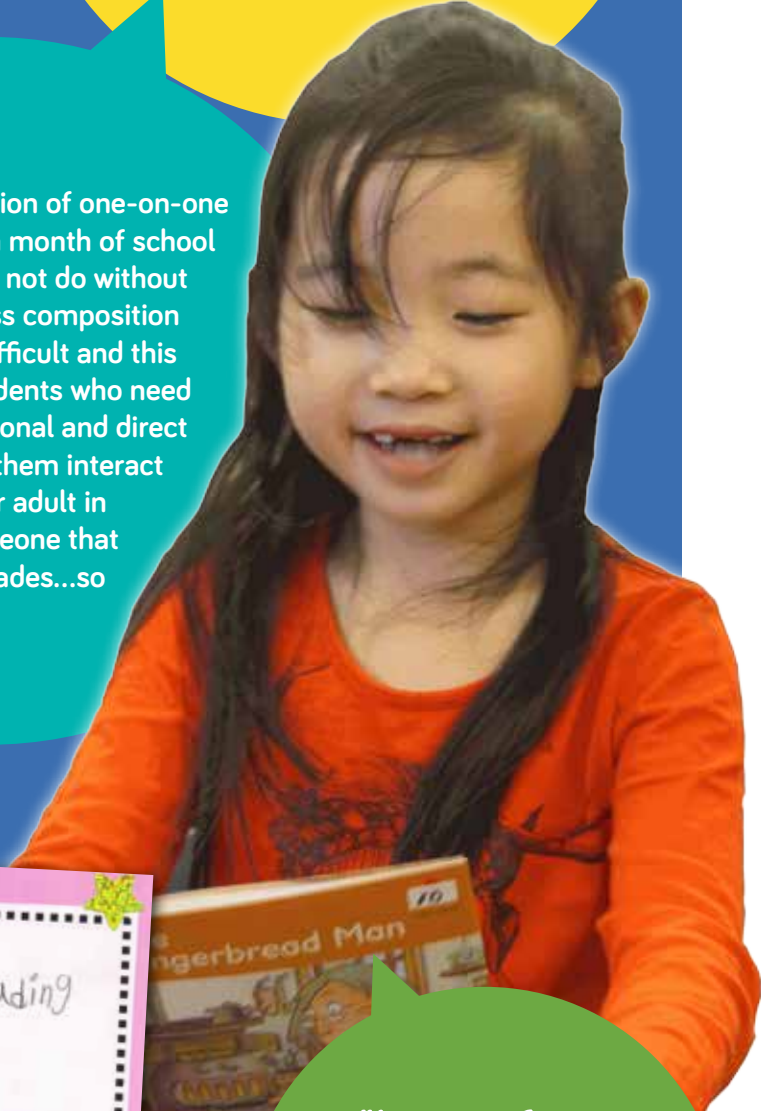
Classroom teachers in all of our schools recognize the value of the ONE TO ONE program for their students:

"We are an inner city school. Many of our students do not have parents/guardians who read to them because of various reasons including working long hours, not speaking English, or just do not have a capacity to parent their children that would include a home reading culture. This program gives them a regular opportunity to share a book with a caring adult who is interested in them as readers."

"One 30-minute session of one-on-one achieves as much as a month of school on a 1:30 ratio. I could not do without this program. Our class composition is more diverse and difficult and this really benefits the students who need that kind of more personal and direct interaction. It also let them interact positively with another adult in their community. Someone that does not give them grades...so they can relax more."

"I am a faster reader now. I understand what I read better."

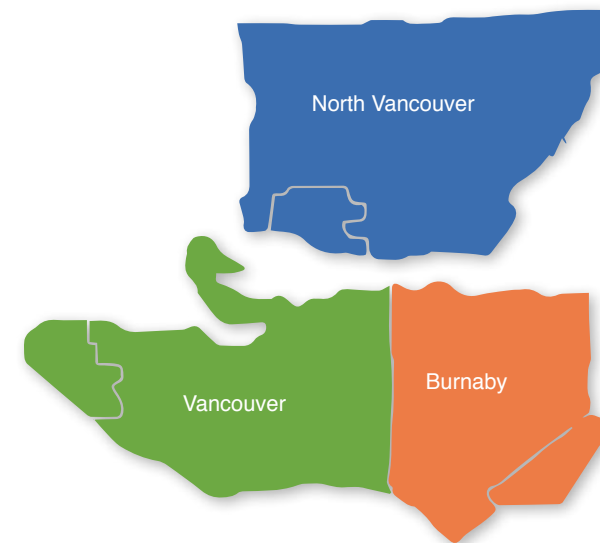

## THE COMMUNITIES WE SERVE

ONE TO ONE Literacy Society is proud of our impact across British Columbia, helping 3,300 young students become readers. To reach the maximum number of students, the program operates under two different models:



### LOCAL PROGRAM

The ONE TO ONE Local Program is directly managed and funded by the Society office in Vancouver. This past year, this included schools in Vancouver, Burnaby, and North Vancouver. Future plans see the program expanding into adjacent districts.

### PROVINCIAL PROGRAM

The ONE TO ONE Provincial Program operates under a slightly different model for districts outside of the Vancouver area. A literacy organization in the community manages the program day-to-day, but ONE TO ONE Literacy Society provides them with all training, resources, and ongoing support.

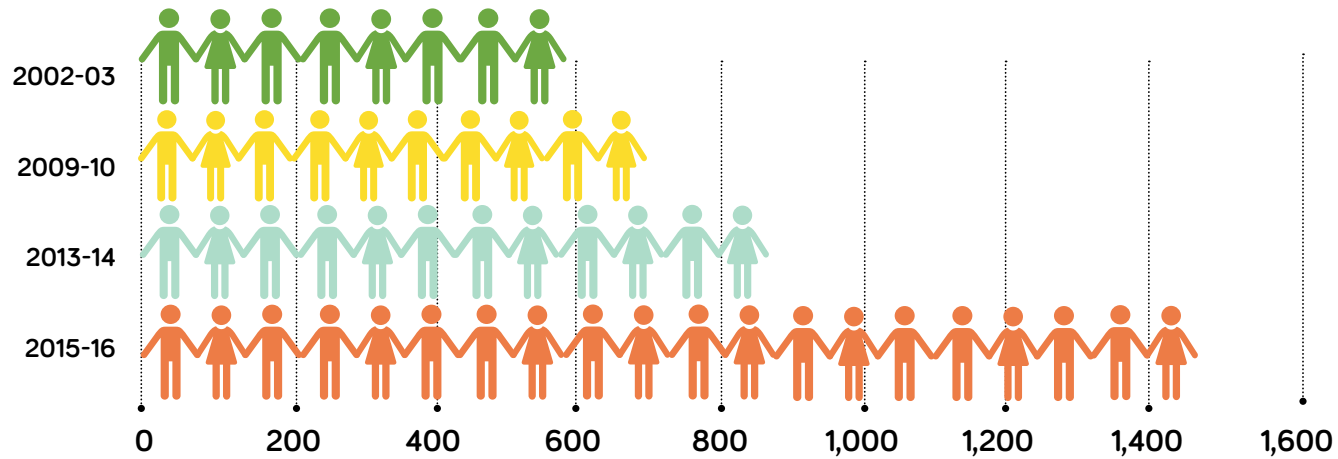
# THE SCHOOLS WE SERVE: LOCAL PROGRAM

This past year, our program expanded significantly with the addition of 13 new elementary schools for a total of 84 – the largest increase in our program’s history.

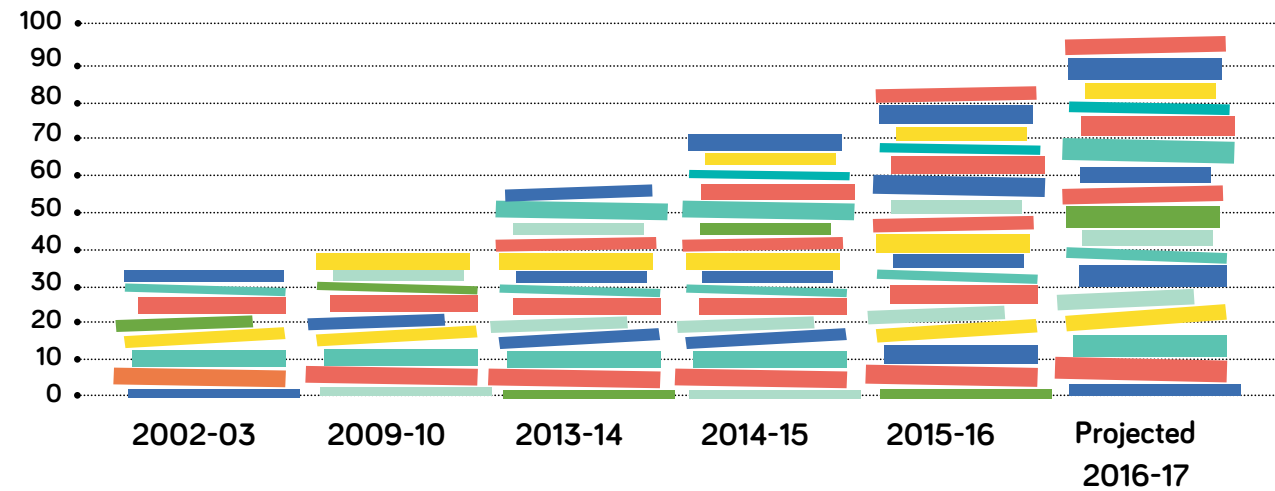
ONE TO ONE’s 350 volunteer tutors worked one-on-one with over 1,450 struggling young students in these 84 schools.

All schools are provided with a specialized book box and other literacy resources. Our team of Area Liaisons work closely with school teaching staff and with the volunteers to ensure the program is successful. There is no cost to schools or students to participate in the ONE TO ONE program.

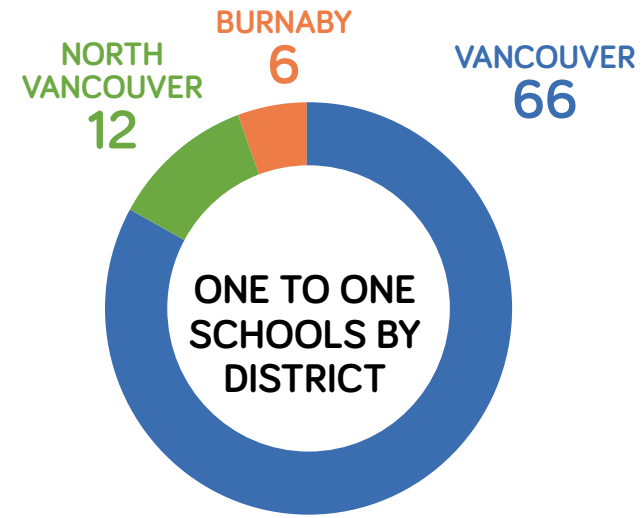
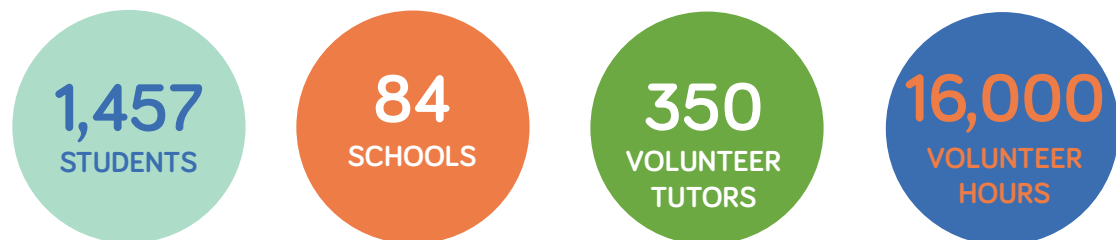
## Number of Students in the ONE TO ONE Program

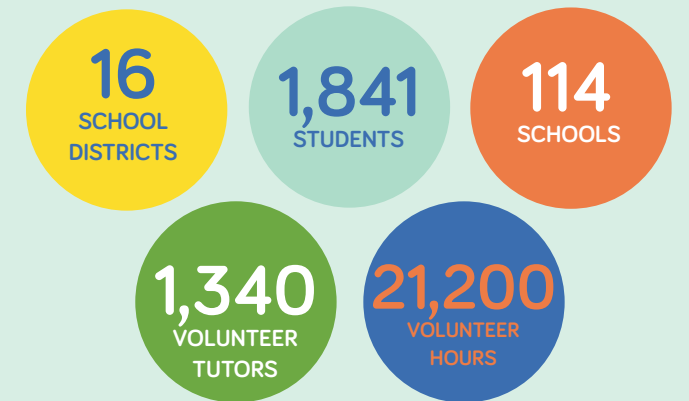

# PROVINCIAL PROGRAM

In 2015-2016, ONE TO ONE made significant progress in launching a new Provincial Program to enable the program to grow to districts outside the Vancouver area. To achieve this, we implemented a number of new initiatives, including:

- ➔ The addition of a Provincial Program Coordinator to the ONE TO ONE staff team
- ➔ The addition of a Regional Liaison to support programs in the Okanagan and Kootenay regions
- ➔ Development of a comprehensive Provincial Program resource package and training program for new regions who wish to adopt the ONE TO ONE program
- ➔ Identification of those districts that had been independently operating the program, assessment of their program needs, and provision of direct support to ensure success.

## VOLUNTEERS: *The Heart of the ONE TO ONE Program*

ONE TO ONE is grateful to the hundreds of volunteers who have given the gift of their time, their experience, and their passion for reading. Each spends at least one morning or afternoon every week from October to June, many of them year after year. It is our volunteers who work directly with the students and make the ONE TO ONE Literacy program so successful.

We had a very successful year with 148 new volunteer tutors added to the program. We hosted many activities to provide training and support, as well as additional events to show our appreciation for these volunteers. Here are some highlights:

- ➔ Provided nine 3-hour training sessions to provide new volunteers with reading strategies and tools to use during their tutoring sessions with students.
- ➔ Our 6 Area Liaisons offered support and mentorship to all volunteers in the program.
- ➔ Offered a series of 5 Coffee Chats, attended by over 80 volunteers, providing an opportunity for all volunteers to meet each other and to share ideas and best practices.
- ➔ Organized our annual in-service training session in February, attended by 80 volunteer tutors. Our guest speaker, Wanda Salewski, Principal at Bridge Elementary School in Richmond, inspired our volunteers to create a joyful reading experience for their students.

ONE TO ONE'S IMPACT IN THE COMMUNITY AND TO YOUNG READERS WOULD NOT BE POSSIBLE WITHOUT THESE DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS. AND THEY FIND THE EXPERIENCE TO BE VERY REWARDING:

"Two years ago I had a boy from Grade 2 who came in declaring he "couldn't read". Even the simplest book, with one word per page, would intimidate him. By the time our term was finished he was reading - and reading with confidence. He seemed to really look forward to our sessions, closely watched his growth up the levelled chart and described reading as "fun". Walking through the hall some time later I saw a poster he had made about his favorite books."

"This program is so well-organized. Within a week of attending my first training session, I was placed in a school and had been contacted by the school coordinator and the regional liaison - that is impressive! The whole concept of ONE TO ONE is so good. I really feel that I have helped some children learn to read and get enjoyment from reading. On my first day back after Spring Break, I went to the classroom and one of my students immediately ran up to me and threw her arms around me. How can you top that as a reward for volunteering!"

"As she was leaving her session with me an outgoing, expressive girl once said, "You're not my tutor you know..." which disconcerted me - to say the least, but then just as she went out the door she added, "... You're my friend," and ran away."

# FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

2015-16 marked a major milestone for ONE TO ONE's fund development. As awareness of our organization grew, so did our donor base. We received grants from a number of new organizations, as well as donations from corporate and individual donors. We received a very generous anonymous donation that enabled the launch of our Provincial Program. We held our 11th Annual Spelling Bee Challenge, which raised a record \$52,000, and participated in Giving Tuesday.

We are very grateful to IGA Stores of BC for their "Top Up at the Till" campaigns held in September and June. Customers had the opportunity to donate a toonie to ONE TO ONE while making their purchases. As well as raising funds, this partnership raised the profile of our program and helped secure new volunteer tutors.

The power of literacy drives our community to give both their volunteer time and their financial support. Our donors come from a wide range of backgrounds and contribute in all kinds of ways – donating speaker's fees, holding fundraisers, attending our Spelling Bee, donating Christmas gifts from book clubs, authors donating proceeds of book sales – among other creative avenues.

It is these generous donors who have allowed us to expand the program at an accelerated rate, including program expansion to other regions throughout BC. We want all students who struggle with reading to have access to the ONE TO ONE program and develop literacy skills for life.

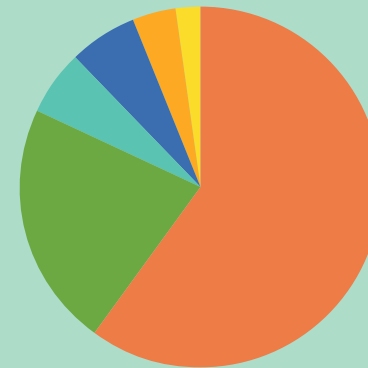

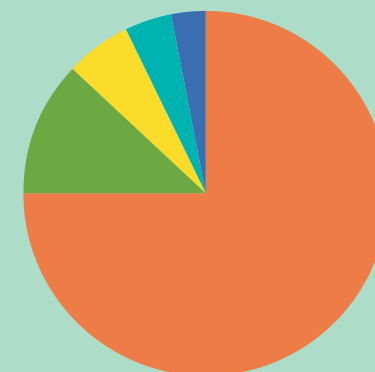

## ADDITIONAL PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

With the generous support of the SpencerCreo Foundation, ONE TO ONE has found a new home for our growing program. After 14 years at Admiral Seymour Elementary, we moved on May 1st into the new SpencerCreo Centre at #212 – 475 Main Street, sharing the new space with 8 other non-profits. Not only does this new centre provide sufficient space for ONE TO ONE, but the shared office concept encourages the exchange of ideas and best practices amongst all of our organizations.

ONE TO ONE continued our major fundraising push to provide a book box -- a complete set of specialized books, consisting of over 120 titles -- to all 84 local program schools. As we continue to add more schools, the need to fund more book boxes continues to ensure that all new schools we welcome to the local program receive this core book box as their first gift from ONE TO ONE. Fundraising also enables us to provide supplementary books and additional resources.

We were again the fortunate charity partner of A Good Book Drive in November, receiving almost 600 new children's books.
